Convocation

Pronouncement of Marriage

Introduction of the Couple

Friends and family, old and new - brothers and sisters, old and new, with hearty congratulations and best wishes, I present to you Grm and Bde, husband and wife.

Marriage Ceremony No. 9 – *Very, very short*

Really, really, really short, but still married.

Once upon a time, a couple who were having a big wedding on a cruise ship wanted to have the legalities done first. “Yes, this certificate from the Captain of a Carnival Cruise Line ship is our only proof that we’re married.” What if you need a certified copy 20 years from now? Where will you get it? They had the right idea – get married first in Minnesota.

They didn’t want to duplicate anything they would be doing on the ship ceremony – like exchanging vows and rings. So this is the absolute minimum.

Expression of Intent

To Groom: Grm, do you want to marry Bde?

Groom: I do. / Yes. / Yup, / Yah. / Yah sure, you betcha.
